Parker J. Palmer Courage to Lead Award



The Parker J. Palmer Courage to Lead Award honors designated institutional officials (DIOs) who have demonstrated excellence in overseeing residency and fellowship programs at their Sponsoring Institutions. DIOs have authority and responsibility for all graduate medical education (GME) programs in a teaching hospital, community hospital, or other type of institution that sponsors GME programs. Parker J. Palmer is the author of the book *The Courage to Teach*; his promotion of the concept of "living divided no more" has proven relevant to teaching in academic health centers.

After finding that burnout was higher among female [learners] on our annual resident wellness survey, Dr. Unruh supported a multiphase focus group study: "Female Trainee and Faculty Experiences." In addition to identifying the problems, this study aimed to identify actionable items that improve the [education and] training experience and build mentoring relationships. These discussion groups led to free breast pumps and refrigeration support for all lactating parents, a monthly female physicians discussion group series, a planning a family series, computers in the lactation rooms, and emergency childcare coverage."
